## The Faces of Phlamoudhi: Ian J. Cohn's rediscovered photographs capture life in a small village on the north coast of Cyprus in 1972

SALEM, Ore. — The Hallie Ford Museum of Art at Willamette University is pleased to present "lan J. Cohn: The Faces of Phlamoudhi" opening on February 9 and continuing through April 28, 2019 in the Print Study Center.

Organized by New York architect and photographer Ian J. Cohn, with the assistance of Hallie Ford Museum of Art director John Olbrantz, the exhibition of photographs presents an intimate glimpse into the life of Phlamoudhi, a small village on the Mediterranean island of Cyprus.

Taken in the summer of 1972 for his personal use while Cohn was a graduate student serving as the official photographer for the Columbia University archaeological expedition, the photographs have since been recognized as a unique documentary record of life in this remote part of northern Cyprus. Less than two years later, in August 1974, Turkey invaded Cyprus, forcibly displacing more that 155,000 Greek Cypriot citizens, including the the entire population of the village.

Stored in a box for almost 35 years before they were serendipitously "rediscovered," Cohn's photographs were declared a Cypriot ethnographic treasure and exhibited at the Cyprus Museum in 2009. Since then, Cohn has reconnected with the community in diaspora, returned to the now Turkish-occupied village, and re-photographed many of his subjects. The ongoing story of the displaced community and the inexorable effects of the passage of time are documented in several more recent images also on view.

In 2009 Cohn published "The Faces of Phlamoudhi: Life in a Small Village on the North Coast of Cyprus, Summer 1972: A Photographic Essay" which will be available at the museum.

Cohn will deliver a lecture entitled "Phlamoudhi: From the Bronze Age to the Digital Era," on Saturday, February 9 beginning at 5 p.m. in the Paulus Lecture Hall in the Willamette University College of Law. The following day "The Faces of Phlamoudhi," a documentary film by Rupert Barclay will be shown beginning at 2 p.m. in the Roger Hull Lecture Hall. Admission to the lecture and film are complimentary.

This exhibition has been supported by an endowment gift from the Hallie Ford Exhibition Fund of the Hallie Ford Museum of Art and by general operating support grants from the City of Salem's Transient Occupancy Tax funds and the Oregon Arts Commission.




