Symposium:

Lines of Attention: Collecting Drawings in Europe, 1500-1800

Lines of Attention: Collecting Drawings in Europe, 1500-1800 brings some of the foremost Renaissance and Baroque art historians in the United States to Salem to lecture on different aspects of collecting drawings in Europe, 1500-1800. The purpose of the symposium is to help contextualize the drawing collection of Alessandro Maggiori.

In the morning sessions, Robert Williams, professor of art history at the University of California, Santa Barbara, will lecture on the painter and writer Giorgio Vasari (1511-1574) as an art collector; Ricardo De Mambro Santos, assistant professor of art history at Willamette University, will speak on painter and biographer Karel van Mander (1548-1606) and the development of drawing collections in Holland around 1600; and Kristel Renee Smentek, assistant professor of art history at MIT, will lecture on European drawings and the 18th century science of the connoisseur.

In the afternoon sessions, Blair Hixson Davis, lecturer in art history at the University of California, Irvine, will speak on the Roman drawings of architect Charles Percier (1764-1838), and Dawn Odell, professor of art history at Lewis and Clark College, will lecture on diplomat Andreas Everadus van Braam Houckgeest's (1739-1801) collection of Chinese drawings. There will be several coffee and lunch breaks throughout the day, and at the conclusion of the symposium, participants will have an opportunity to view the Maggiori collection.

Lecture/Chamber Music Recital:

The Sounds of Image: Conversations on Rossini and Raphael Marva Duerksen, Ricardo De Mambro Santos

This *duetto* of lecture and concert presents Gioacchino Rossini (1792-1868) as art lover and composer. Exhibition curator Ricardo De Mambro Santos will discuss Rossini as an art collector and his profound admiration for Renaissance painter Raphael (1483-1520) who Rossini praised as "the highest paradigm of artistic perfection". Marva Duerkson, associate professor of music at Willamette, will discuss Rossini as one of the most celebrated Italian composers of the 19th century. A concert of Rossini scores will follow the lecture.
